## FINAL ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT REPORT UC BERKELEY 2020 LONG RANGE DEVELOPMENT PLAN & CHANG-LIN TIEN CENTER FOR EAST ASIAN STUDIES

### REVISIONS TO THE 2020 LRDP IN RESPONSE TO COMMENTS

Defers 500 of the 2,300 net new parking spaces proposed in the draft 2020 LRDP until after 2020, if a route is approved and construction begins on the AC Transit Bus Rapid Transit/Telegraph project by January 2010.

Eliminates the 100 units of faculty housing in the Hill Campus proposed in the draft 2020 LRDP.

Redesignates the Northwest Promontory, the undeveloped site located southwest of the intersection of Centennial and Grizzly Peak, as a reserve site, as it was in the 1990-2005 LRDP.

Expands the boundary of the Campus Park “classical core” to include the area defined by the Life Science Buildings on the north and Strawberry Creek on the south.

### REVISIONS TO THE 2020 LRDP EIR IN RESPONSE TO COMMENTS

Commits UC Berkeley to regularly survey the transportation practices of students and employees, and to reduce the parking construction program if survey results indicate reduced demand.

Recognizes that UC Berkeley implemented the Bear Pass pilot program in fall 2004, providing unlimited rides on AC Transit buses to UC Berkeley employees for a \$20 monthly fee.

Confirms the amount of UC Berkeley parking under the 2020 LRDP would be comparable to or lower than several other urban research universities suggested by EIR commentators as having noteworthy transportation programs.

Recommits UC Berkeley to using the July 2003 Draft Southside Plan, once adopted by the City of Berkeley, as our guide to future development in the Southside.

Provides that, whenever the UC Berkeley Design Review Committee considers a project in the City Environs, a staff representative designated by the city in which the project is located would be invited to attend and comment on the project.

Continues participation by UC Berkeley in the Hills Emergency Forum, which coordinates fuel management, emergency preparedness, and evacuation planning in the East Bay hills.

Commits UC Berkeley to ongoing salvage or recycling of 50% of construction, demolition or land clearing waste.

### NEW IN THE FINAL 2020 LRDP EIR

The Final EIR includes eleven Thematic Responses, which assemble the university’s comprehensive responses to eleven substantive topics repeatedly raised by people who commented on the draft documents. The Thematic Responses appear as section 11.1, which begins at page 11.1-1 of Volume 3A.
